




Boarding Report

2022 was a year of not only consolidation of the environment that we have been building, a place where people want to come, want to be and want to stay. An environment where you feel SAFE, but also a year to challenge us around why we do what we do. After the fantastic year of 2021 which saw 7 Graduates depart into the open world on to their next phase, we welcomed 14 new year 7 young people into our environment which was met with anticipation, anxiety and excitement while we planned for what our environment of support for these young people was.

I would like to take you into a small piece of their worlds for a moment...

You are 11 years of age, and the time has come when you have completed year 6 and primary school near where you live. Now everyone is telling you it is time to grow up. Are you ready? Are you packed? Can you handle what adults call 'Transition'? The days are counting down to where you get on that small aircraft and leave family, home, community, friends and siblings, routine, food, culture, habits and hobbies, and your true sense of BELONGING. The ONE place you feel truly COMFORTABLE

in life. Now you enter AFLCYHB Boarding, live with other boys of all ages, from different communities and potentially states, not to mention Uncle Kane and his crazy antics and new rules for living. Then you have to navigate through a new school, much bigger than you are used to, with more students than there are people back home.

Term 1 - Leadership, Routine & Transition

Term 1 2022 AFLCYHB welcomed 14 young year 7s just like you. Whilst this sounds scary, our team and environment embraced the challenge and successfully worked through the transition experiences, i.e. homesickness etc. collectively led by our well-being and education teams the young people were able to successfully work through their first 100 days. We introduced more staff to our education team with more tutors coming on board to support in schools. This assisted in enabling all 14 year 7's making it through the first 2 terms which was a credit to all involved but mostly the young people themselves. We also had a potentially strong senior group in 2022 so we concentrated on developing leadership

skills and full house feeling of community and togetherness. We held our annual Term 1 Leadership Camp at Mungalli Falls, which encouraged engagement, teamwork and leadership. Out of this our Leadership Group was formed with Johoiakim Kawangka (House Captain), Rusia Bann & Walter Satrick (Deputy Captains), Romin Dean, Steven Gilbert Kean, Kai Koomeeta and Chase Loogatha being selected by fellow young people and staff to lead the house for 2022.

Term 2 - Cultural Engagement & Attendance

This term saw the young people return with a sense of excitement of the back of a successful term 1 of school and boarding engagement. Our team of staff had worked hard to create a calm environment of support which seemed to encourage the young people to return to a place where they not just needed but wanted to be. Term 2 also was the opening of the Cairns Junior AFL Season and this year we had 3 Eagles teams entered into the local competition with the U16 Boys, U14 Boys and for the first time an U12 boys in Division 2. For the U12's this was a new experience which provided key learning

and most of all the notion of just having a go at something new. For our education team Term 2 focus was on attendance and engagement and pushing boundaries around achievement. We held a boarding camp on Fitzroy Island which was a great experience and focused on getting out of boarding and returning to home life for a weekend. We introduced our new cultural program initiatives specifically the Dance Program and a wellbeing initiative in the Music Program. Rushon George is a year 9 man from Rossville, Cape York, who in Term 1 was severely at risk due to no purpose but this term he smiled each day as he got off the bus as he grabbed the key to the music room to jam. This calmed his thoughts and created a sense of purpose. Goes alright on the guitar and mic too just quietly.

Term 3 - Encourage the positive narrative and challenge the status quo

The third term started well with the young men returning from holidays refreshed and ready to get started. However, it became quite challenging as the term progressed. High expectations within school, and boarding life brought challenging moments to everyone at AFLCYHB.

However, the positive was that we experienced a show of resilience within our environment and were able to deliver the support required for our young people. Key events including the AFL Cape York House Foundation Function at the AFL in Melbourne was treated to a select group of Torres Strait Island and Aboriginal Dancers from AFL Cape York House performing in front of 450+ guests. The Life Experience of this event for our young people and staff was so immense that they have come back to boarding with an intense drive for more. We were able to send a group of young men away for the Chris Johnson Cup in Bamaga NPA, for the first time since COVID. This was great reward to those who were selected and gave opportunity to Rushon George, Masie Mosby, Jermaine Ahmat and Steven Gilbert-Kean to represent the house at the Flying Boomerangs Camp. With Rushon George and Masie Mosby going on to be selected in the Flying Boomerangs to play in Melbourne. Our Eagles teams continued on in the season with Finals representation and our U12's team winning the U12 Division 2 Grand Final. The experience showed them the opportunities of life experience that boarding provides.

Term 4 - Fun Celebration & School Achievement

Term 4 is still on the go as I write this, however it has been a jam packed term already with key events like our Stand Up Against Stand Up Against Domestic & Family Violence High Tea which was the best one yet. Our young men not only engaged but shone and presented a proud, strong and responsible cohort of young men. Our Rio Tinto Industry Tour was another success, and finally our AFLCYH Awards & Graduation Night which was another amazing event at AFLCYHB, where we celebrated significant achievements of our young people. Our Cultural Program took a major step up with Bernard Singleton conducting Woomera Workshops and Spear Making through Term 4, assisting with our young people's sense of identity, and we wave 'see you later' to our three graduates Jimmy, Johoiakim and Romin but look forward to welcoming our new faces in 2023 for another big year in Boarding.

Boarding Life Report

2022 was another BIG YEAR in Boarding, not only for our Young People but Staff as well. AFL Cape York House – for Girls (AFLCYHG) was again at FULL CAPACITY. Full of Young Girls wanting to LIVE, LEARN & GROW in an environment enriched with Opportunities, Positivity and Support.

AFLCYHG is a place of stability and consistency for our young people. We had 81% of our 2021 cohort RETURN (back into Boarding for 2022), whilst excitedly in 2022, we welcomed 14 NEW Enrolments, seven (7) of which were Y7 Students; first timers in High School.

Of the 45 Young People that live at AFLCYHG, we have twenty-two communities represented; North of Cairns. THIS YEAR; AFLCYHG had nine (9) Y12 Students Graduate; which is the BIGGEST cohort we have had since we opened in 2019. Lency, Margie, Lythia, Tanayah and Layleen were all here when we opened in January 2019; without these girls – the place is certainly going to feel different.

In 2022 we continued the PEER LEADERSHIP tradition of appointing House Captains & Leaders to help create an ENVIRONMENT that allows ALL Young People to be:

PROUD | UNITED | COMMITTED | SUCCESSFUL

In 2022, our STAFFING was the strongest it's ever been; we had over 45 Staff focused on providing a program that nurtures, guides and grows our young people to be who they want to be and do what they want to do and grow older positively. Our staff pass down plenty of lived and learned experiences that create conversations, memories, opportunities and pathways. Our program here in Boarding is centred around the young person and is holistic, rather than singularly academia focused. AFLCYHG provided nearly 40,000 hours of operational support; inclusive of Health & Wellbeing, Management/Leadership, Domestic & Careers & Pathway Planning; all in the hope to continue to provide positive options for students to engage in. To all of our staff - THANK YOU for all you do; for the Young People and each other.

We had some really positive results in the EDUCATION space, led by Aunty Megan and her team of Tutors/ Mentors. We had 84% of our cohort assessable in Literacy and Numeracy achievements which is a direct result of our Young People's willingness to ATTEND & ENGAGE at school. AFLCYHG held a strong 82% school attendance measure for available days to attend with 15% explained absences. AFLCYHG committed over 4700 hours of Tuition Support allocated in 2022; to assist with

Curriculum-Aligned Support, One-on-One Mentoring and maintaining high levels of school engagement. This, along with our young people's desire to IMPROVE; saw 81% of Students achieve minimum passing standards in Literacy, whilst 56% were meeting minimum Numeracy Standards: relevant to their cohorts. Over 60% of our cohort maintained or improved their Literacy & Numeracy grades, in comparison to 2021 records. AS AN ENTIRE COHORT: 57% of Students average a C-Grade in English & Maths, with 22% holding a B-Grade and 8% with A-Grades. What this tells us is that "nothing is impossible to those who try."

Aunty Lu & Aunty Chantelle spent the entire 2022 year actively engaging in daily supports and life skills to better our Young People's WELLBEING. With over 350 medical or allied health appointments, 40+ hours of Cultural & Spiritual Support, 30+ hours of Education Workshops - externally facilitated; specific to Lifestyle Choices & Behaviours – we consistently created positive opportunities to learn and make healthier choices in our Young People's developing lives. It is never easy, but Aunty Lu & Chantelle always persisted to get the best outcomes and services for our Young People.

AFLCYHG role in CAREERS & PATHWAYS is to open as many doors as possible for our Young People to try, listen, learn, like and want to choose. Although Aunty Helen has moved on from AFLCYHG, we extend a sincere thank you for all her work in creating partnerships, relationships and connections for our Program. In 2022 AFLCYHG has facilitated nearly 100 days of Careers, Transition and Pathway Development; through Work Placements or Employment Opportunities; both in Cairns and within our Communities. To be ready for work or job opportunities, you need to understand purpose and outcomes; so in 2022, AFLCYHG created over 75+ hours of Leadership, Empowerment and Personal Development Opportunities for Students to ensure when their time comes - they are ready to take their chosen pathway!

Within BOARDING our Program was FILLED with FUN EXPERIENCES. Anything from: Cultural/Leadership Camps, Road Trips to Townsville (to watch the Cowboys), Fitzroy Island, Melbourne, Weipa, Bamaga, Freshwater and Saltwater Swimming, Fishing, Hunting, Youth Group Nights, Discos, Movies, BBQ's, Rock Climbing, Tourist Activities, Laser Tag, Ice Skating and Shopping; you name it - we did it. All of our Boarding Activities are to REWARD HARD WORK and PROMOTE POSITIVE CHOICES. We hope that through all the activities we did, the Young People created memories and friendships. We hope they tried new experiences, found new passions, became closer with one another and realised that their fun was due to their effort, attitude and engagement at school. We live with consistent rules. routines, responsibilities and expectations to create familiarisation, accountability but empowerment; so that when life starts outside of School/Boarding; they are ready. What we do TODAY affects how we behave TOMORROW!



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Wellbeing Report

2022 has been a great year at the Boys house, with some return to normalcy after the past 2 years of COVID restrictions. All Boys returning to AFLCYH settled in well and our year 7's took to boarding with minimal issues with the older boys showing them the ropes and helping out with homesickness and routine. It wasn't long before the juniors took over in being amazing with routine, readiness for school, and sometimes even showing the seniors up.

Term 1 had some hiccups with sickness and young people having to isolate. The boys, families and staff all handled this well, with regular communication with families and arranging ways for young people to stay healthy mentally and physically. QLD Health guidelines were closely monitored and adhered to in a regularly changing environment.

At the end of Term 1, I (TJ) returned to work at the Boys House after travelling for a year around Australia. I am so lucky to be able to return to the Boys House, to be able to work with such amazing young people, families and staff. It has been great to be back and working with the boys, staff and schools to ensure Wellbeing needs are being met and that the boys feel happy, safe, and supported whilst living away from their families.

Throughout the year the focus for the year has been to support the boys' Wellbeing holistically; addressing areas such as physical health, mental health, family involvement, developing a supportive community, and connection to culture.





Wellbeing is everyone's responsibility and staff have been supporting the young people in a multitude of ways to ensure they feel comfortable, safe, happy and well supported within the boarding environment.

It is important for our young people to be physically well, with regular check-ups, to engage well in their education. Aunty Gladys has been excellent at ensuring that all boys have had their yearly scheduled 715 Indigenous Health Checks and dental check-ups. Every time a young person is unwell, or has an injury, Aunty Gladys has arranged appropriate medical treatment and ensured families of young people are kept in the loop in regards to their student's health. We even had students from JCU dental come to the house to teach the boys about good dental hygiene in an interactive session.

The boys have had opportunities to engage in multiple avenues of fitness throughout the year which supports them physically and mentally. The Boys House is lucky to have our own AFL teams and because of this, regular fitness/training throughout Terms 1 - 3. To complement AFL, and also for those boys who don't play AFL, Uncle Brendan has been amazing at engaging our young people in the Deadly Runners program; with running often being compared to meditation in regards to benefits for people's mental wellbeing and resilience.

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The boys have also attended regular classes in Term 3 in a Boxing program at Redlynch Boxing Fitness, which has taught discipline and respect as well as being excellent for fitness.

Further to activities at the house, the boys have ongoing access to support through the Wellbeing team to learn how to handle stress, build resilience and assist with understanding their emotions and explore different coping mechanisms. This has been achieved through multiple ways such as regular walks in a park or at the beach as time out, going for a cruise, and one on one time to provide support for the boys.

There is always space with the Wellbeing team for the boys to relax, engage in art, or just come for a yarn after a day at school.

It has been an excellent year, with staff from all areas of boarding stepping up to provide support to the boys at boarding to engage in education, and support with all avenues of wellbeing.

Wellbeing Report

2022 was an extremely positive year for our young people and their wellbeing. As we know if we can invest in our health and wellbeing from a younger age, we can grow with good habits and routines as we get older. Our young people have really grasped the idea of health and wellbeing and are at the forefront of ensuring they are fit and healthy.

We have had many young people access support through medical and dental appointments, and further support through either physiotherapy or counselling. This initiative highlights what strong young females we have in our space.

Throughout the year AFL Cape York has engaged with many external services, building on existing relationships and even creating new ones. Health and Medical Services accessed this year include;

- Wuchopperen; for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health checks, general medical support and Rheumatic Heart Disease support around injections and education
- JCU Dental Team; Dental education around upkeep of good oral hygiene and opportunity to make individual mouthguards
- Apunipima; for sexual health education age specific (senior cohort sessions)
- Headspace; providing positive mental health education and awareness
- Mental Health and Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs Service; education around substance use/misuse age specific
- Perfect Teeth for supporting our young people with their dental work and treatment plans
- Redlynch Medical Centre for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health checks and general medical support



AFL Cape York House for Girls has also had the opportunity to collaborate with Firesticks Alliance to ensure our young people were engaged in Cultural activities/camps/learnings. Siobhan Singleton has been instrumental in developing sessions that are hands on and practical for our young women and can be practised in everyday life. One session included a bush food and medicine yarn and share and the other was a day out on Koah Country.

AFL Cape York House for Girls were also fortunate enough to engage in a ceramics art workshop with Susan Reys from Kgari 3 Sisters Art Gallery in Cairns.

Throughout the year our young people engaged in many activities including, visiting Yarrabah again for a Camp on country, spent time on the weekends fishing and swimming at the beach/creeks, participating and strengthening dance troupes through cultural dance practice and performances and being a

part of smoking ceremonies and blessings of the AFL Cape York House for Girls. A special thank you also goes to Aunty Elsja for putting in her time to educate our junior cohort on puberty, friendships and relationships. We look forward to future education sessions with the Aunties.

We express our most sincere gratitude to all of the services and staff who have invested and given their time, effort and support to our young people. We thank you for being flexible, working with our team and young people, and having the patience needed at times. We look forward to engaging with you all again in 2023.

To you girls- thank you from Aunty Chantelle and Aunty Lu for being amazing. Together we have conquered another year. We look forward to seeing you all back next year. Enjoy your Christmas break and most importantly time with family/friends and on country/community.

Education Letter

2022 has been one of our biggest years yet and has presented its own unique sets of challenges for us here on the Education Team. This is also the year that we have grown the most, adding more and more capable and dedicated members to our team. This year, we have had our largest intake of Junior students in quite some time. As the number of kids grows, so does the variety of needs and demand for extra support. We have been very lucky and grateful for our new members who have been helping to support all the students in boarding here at AFL Cape York Boys House, helping to strengthen not only the education and learning skills, but a lot of their life skills as well. We currently have 12 staff recruited to help support the education of our boys here at AFL Cape York House and we would like to thank them for their continued efforts in supporting the boys.

One of the most challenging times this year was around the end of Term 1, when the threat of COVID-19 was on the rise again. Schools were getting more and

more cases reported, so we made a decision to keep the boys in house. This decision was made to ensure that our boys would stay safe, protected, and fit enough to travel home.

This meant that we had to organise activities all day for the boys as well as setting up times to complete assessment and homework before they leave for home. This week was a test of the determination for both students and staff.

One particular student had to complete about 4 assessments in that week alone. This student worked hard in that week, making sure to complete it all to the best of his ability. At the end of the week the boys were rewarded with a movie where they were given the whole theatre to themselves. That way the boys could do one more fun activity outside of the house while keeping safe.

Not only did we grow in staff capacity, but support from others has also grown. We have obtained some more Infinity brand laptops for our boys to utilise for school



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work and assessments. We would like to especially thank "Uncle Niven", who has kindly volunteered and invested many hours into supporting our young boys' education. He has also assisted AFL Cape York House in securing some amazing new suits for our boys. Lastly this is the year we will have to say goodbye to 3 of our seniors, Jimmy Lifu, Johoiakim Kawangka and Romin Dean. Both Jimmy and Johoiakim began with us in Year 8 and Romin in Year 7. These boys have spent a long time boarding with us and they all have come a long way in their journey and should be proud of what they've done. We wish nothing but the best to all these boys and are proud of the amazing young men they have become.

Adapting and Achieving

From two year 12 students to nine in 2022; It's been a mammoth year for the biggest graduating cohort in AFL Cape York House For Girls' history.

In the first half of the year our juniors enjoyed a visit from Queensland Ambulance Service Indigenous Recruitment Unit who gave them a look into the life of some of the Paramedic workers they see in their own communities. While our seniors got a taste of University life with a tour of JCU and its Science, Nursing and Social Science faculties as well as their onsite accommodation, lecture rooms and Indigenous Support Unit. They also attended a site tour of Hilton Cairns and Mondo's on the Waterfront, where they were put through their paces with mock interviews. Our girls also experienced speed interviewing with Crystalbrook. Looking ahead, they were introduced to the team from IYMP and Gavin from Tenancy Skills to explore their options for living in Cairns after graduating, either for work or further study.

The second half of the year would see our seniors travel to Weipa to experience Rio Tinto's Amrun site for a two day site tour and industry talk - a first for our girls house cohort. We also welcomed a partnership between girls and boys houses and Cairns City Council to further assist and facilitate for our girls and boys experience and training which they can take home to community.

Our seniors chased their self-determined individual pursuits of a successful life outside of boarding. For our grade 11's the importance of licences and first jobs gained momentum with 4/5 having learners licences and Hilda Kellermeier and Edna-Grey Muhamad getting their first taste of the workforce with casual retail jobs. Tahlia Kerindun completed two weeks of Land and Sea Management work experience with Rio Tinto. Yehusha Lifu continued to back herself, completing



GROOTE TRANSITION EXLANDT PROGRAM

An Insight into our Program

What a whirlwind 2022 has been so far! The Groote Eylandt Program has continued on the back of a really strong finish to 2021 with the growth of the young people that represent the Anindilyakwa people of the Groote Eylandt Archipelago being immense in nature.

The growth of student numbers from the previous year has been solidified this year with the focus being on maintaining a core group of students within the confines of the AFL Cape York House family.

As with all of our students who make the decision to leave their home communities to live at AFL Cape York House the level of resilience shown by the young men and women who make up the cohort of the Groote Eylandt is amazing. The statistics for a full year in boarding means that a young person who completes a full calendar year of boarding with us will roughly be away from the confines of their home communities for 280 days a year.

As expressed in the 2021 Yearbook the Groote Eylandt Program was designed as a holistic wrap around approach to guiding the young traditional owners of the Groote Eylandt Archipelago to "walk in two worlds". This journey requires the young people to navigate the complexities of the modern societal landscape whilst continuing to carry the age-old customs and traditions of their country, people, language, stories and dreaming.

It is safe to say that the young people from Groote Eylandt that we are so fortunate to work with, have very much established their pathway in these two worlds. Individually and collectively the young people have developed new connections within their boarding lives as well as finding purpose and passion within their educational lives. The excitement of the students within their academic lives has been palpable with the level of progression being shown by their academic results throughout 2022.

This progression has been aided by the fantastic relationship that AFL Cape York House has been able to develop with Tropical North Learning Academy - Smithfield State High School. The strength-based approach to education adopted by the EALD

(English As An Additional Language/ Dialect) teachers recognises that for many of our students English may be their 2nd/3rd language. This recognition fosters an environment where the student is encouraged to utilise the skills and/or strengths they already possess to tackle any knowledge gaps that may exist within their prior learning. As an organization we are incredibly thankful for the staff that make up this program and look forward to developing this relationship further with the addition of more students from the Groote Eylandt Archipelago in 2023 and beyond.


As with the nature of what we are trying to achieve within the wider organisation of AFL Cape York House - we firmly believe in the saying that it 'takes a village to raise a child'. We are only the strength of those that we surround ourselves with and the Groote Eylandt Program is fortunate to have a significant number of stakeholders that play an important role in our young people's lives.

The education team at GEBIPCAC (Groote

lead by Josie Skelton and her team of traditional owner elders have provided an excellent sounding board of two-way communication - keeping our young people's families and communities updated and involved in their journey at AFL Cape York House.

This support has been exemplified by our other major stakeholders on Groote Eylandt - GEMCO South32 who offered one of our Groote Evlandt alumni (Brayden Mamarika) a full-time apprenticeship opportunity for 2022 and beyond. The flexibility and support shown by Indigenous Participation Coordinator Simon Hartley and his team has been amazing as they have helped Brayden and his family navigate the transition from boarding to full-time employment.

We are excited to see the large cohort of students that we have continue to grow and experience the myriad of fantastic opportunities that life within the confines of the AFL Cape York Groote Eylandt Program have to offer.





This year our students have been fortunate to have our cultural leaders/inspirators provide some great support over the year in providing ancient cultural knowledge on campus through song, dance, language and learning based activities.

Our keepers of knowledge (leaders/inspirators) Uncle Phillip Billy, Bernie Singleton Jnr and Tobias Fatnowna have led our cultural program in 2022.

The AFLCYH Dance Team along with our inspirators could not have developed into professional world class performers without the consistency in cultural leadership of our community volunteers Leroy Mosby, Patrick Vangendenbroek and McFarlane Warria.

Our AFLCYH Dance Team with the support of all these amazing cultural leaders have been choreographing new dances which have led to sharing our culture across 8 partner schools, 3 private schools and performed at private weddings and birthday functions.

A significant highlight for the dance team was performing for St Kilda Football Club during their visit to Cairns during the captains run and being invited to perform in Melbourne at the Essendon Football Club.

Over the past 3 terms our students have attended leadership camps at Mungalli Falls and Fitzroy Island and have engaged in cultural activities such as zazi making, woomera & spear making, kup-murri preparations, ukul hunting, crabbing and fishing.

The students' pride, confidence including their social and emotional wellbeing along with cultural safety have seen a smooth transition into boarding achieving academic success through our program delivery.

Term 4 has seen an introduction of Woomera (spear thrower) and spear making workshops which allows students to craft, learn and engage through the making of traditional hunting objects. Learning to design, shape and source and use materials allows the students to think creatively and practically while establishing safe practices working with their hands and many different tools. With the students' scheduling being centered around schooling and academic outcomes we see the cultural engagements, especially through dancing, woomera and spear making, as something that has drawn the boys together and helped ground them during boarding. Expanding from this into more on country activities/ programs and cultural art & crafts we are building on their enthusiasm to work with their hands and keep creating and sharing with each other, community and families while strengthening connections to culture.

Spiritual Connection Program

The Cultural Program at the AFL Cape York House for Girls saw great engagement over 2022. We acknowledge that keeping connected to culture, family and community is of great importance and therefore is an important component within Boarding. Our Cultural programs have greatly contributed to the wellbeing, happiness and calmness of our students. Additionally, we have held cultural events such as Cultural Camps in Yarrabah and Koah, where our young people have learned about various bush foods and bush medicines. This has made it possible for our young people (and staff) to reconnect to country and learn about the historical survival and way of life of Indigenous people. AFLCYHG invited external guests to lead cultural sessions and activities with our young people. The cultural activities/sessions have included bush medicine, bush tucker, traditional cooking, dancing, singing, weaving, and making cultural attires for use when doing cultural dance. Regular Smoking Ceremonies and Blessings of the House facility was incorporated into our routine over the year.

Thank you very much to everyone who contributed to the AFLCYHG cultural events, activities, and camps. We appreciate you allowing our students to maintain ties to their families, communities, and culture while living away from home. We are grateful for the passion, dedication, knowledge, and support you have provided and shared with our young people throughout the year of 2022.





Game Development Report

In 2022 the Game Development space was set up a bit differently to previous years with Development Coordinator Kieran Sciberras making a move to the far north and setting himself up in Bamaga with his partner, Michelle.

This move allowed Kieran to service the NPA and Torres Strait region whilst immersing himself in community, which enabled him to work closely with young people, community members and local stakeholders on a more consistent basis. This included running AFL programs across 15 islands (16 communities) in the Torres Strait. Kieran was also able to attend more community events including the NPA Show, Dan Ropeyarn Cup and the NPA Cultural Festival - where AFL Cape York was able to set up an information stall promoting our programs. This year also saw the introduction of a school and staff 'containers for change' recycling program - with all proceeds going towards AFL programs across the region - including the sponsoring of three high-school students in the compass club 7km and 21km running events!

On top of our annual Crusader Cups in Cooktown, Weipa and Thursday Island we added some new initiatives to our program introducing the Mitchell River Cup which saw Pormpuraaw and Kowanyama go head to head in Pormpuraaw, while Lockhart River and Coen battled it out in Coen. The Gulf Savannah region got a bigger taste of footy with Crusader Cups being held, and Georgetown, Croydon, Normanton Burketon and Doomadgee getting involved.

We had an NPA team travel down to Cairns to participate in the AFLQ Schools Cup. This was the first time a team further north of Cairns (let alone a team from 1000km north of Cairns!) had participated in the event. A mixed team of boys and girls from year 5 and 6 represented NPA State College and held their own on the field, winning three out of four games. Thanks to our partners at Hinterland Aviation, Bamaga Enterprises Limited and Community Enterprises QLD, we hope that this will become an annual fixture in our game development calendar.

Hopevale and Yarrabah got to verse each other under the lights of Cazalys Stadium as the curtain raiser for the St Kilda vs Port Adelaide match which was a massive highlight of 2022 for all involved.

We also welcomed the return of the Chris Johnson and Angie Nadredre Cup in September in Bamaga. The Under 17 carnival saw young men and women from AFL Cape York Houses, Northern Peninsula Area State College and Tagai State College compete in an exciting day of AFL action.

Another huge highlight from this year was no doubt the thrilling win that our Crusader Under 12 side had over Darling Downs on the Sunshine Coast during the Queensland School State Champs on the Sunshine Coast
